I also enclose a free copy of my " Among The Clergy " with refs. pp. 28,29, 31 to famous rectory visitors; pp. 79, 80 to Campbell College. I have little to add to these except that I remember the Campbell College boys sitting always in the transept, and a copper wire being stretched across its arch to help them hear the sermon better.

As far as I know Mrs Maria Todd of 5c. Ballybeen Park, Dundonald, a parishioner of Canon Frizelle, is alive. She was general domestic and nurse at the Rectoryc. 1921-25 and would recall those days. The night at Christmastime 1922 my sister was born a little prematurely, the rector set out across Belfast with motor-bike and side-car to fetch the nurse. Owing to the then troubles there was a curfew and at nearly every cross-roads he was stopped for identification, going and coming, with the result that the baby was born before he got back, with the help of the doctor and Maria Bell.

The reference to Mr Gatphoh also explains how Canon Hayes brought back from India the carpet long in the sanctuary at St. Mark's.

I expect Miss Lucy Stokes, Mrs Gundred Forrest and perhaps Miss Esmé Mitchell and others will be able to add to these memories. Perhaps they can tell the year I saw the gold weathervane cock enormous on the grass down for repairs, and the repairs to the inside of the roof when Robert Morrow ? fell from the scaffolding but clutched a rope and saved his life though his hands were badly skinned. My earliest recollection of worship is being in the front seat at the south extremity for a Sunday afternoon Children's service. My mother sang in the choir from the time she came as a bride in 1914 and I seem to remember T.B. infection was feared among the members and she advised burning and renewing all the old choir books. We children sat much further back and the voices seemed very far away and apart from any person.
