A Message from Helene, Rector in St Mark's

Some animals are more mesmerising than others. Kangaroos and wallabies fall into that category. There is something happy and joyous in their appearance that brings a smile to my face. They radiate vigour and energy and they have quite some stamina. A kangaroo's top hopping speed is 43 miles per hour, which they only tend to use for short distances. Hopping at a moderate speed of just over 9 miles per hour maintains energy and consistency. No matter their speed – they have a spring in their step.

Springtime is a cheerful season when many of us walk more energetically, with a spring in our steps. We may decide to embrace something new to enhance and

enrich our bodies and souls. It is tempting to hop into these new endeavours at top-speed, but maybe this year we need to adopt a more sustainable and moderate speed to build up our endurance.

There is one person in the Bible who is described as a man walking with a spring in his step – Moses. My impression is that his spring was moderate. Throughout his lifelong walk, he maintained time in God's presence. He listened to God's direction, as he led God's people on a forty-year long journey from captivity to freedom. Despite the people's grumbling and challenging behaviour, he kept on walking, walking with a spring in his step.

Walking in St Patrick's footsteps and lighting beacons of faith

You are warmly welcome to the Diocesan St Patrick's Day festivities on Saturday 16 March, beginning with a service of Holy Communion in Saul parish church and a pilgrimage walk to Downpatrick. The main festival service will begin in Down Cathedral, Downpatrick at 11.45 am with speaker Bishop Jill Duff from Lancaster. 'Light the Beacons' is the theme, focusing on prayer for a re-kindling of the fire of faith that Patrick lit in Ireland almost 1600 years ago, and a symbolic fire will be lit outside the Cathedral. Each parish will be given a beacon and a container of oil which will be lit the next evening at St Mark's.

On St Patrick's Day, Sunday 17 March join us for a special 6.30 pm service in St Mark's, starting in the church building in prayer and reflection and moving outside around the firepit where we light our beacon of faith. We will then join together in the Parish Hall for a St Patrick's supper, and some cèilidh dancing, suitable for all ages. *Please register with the Parish office for catering purposes*.



Holy Week and Easter in St Mark's







Wednesday 27 March 3.45 pm Holy Communion, with hymns.

Maundy Thursday 28 March 7.30 pm

On this night we remember how Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper, a meal we know as Holy Communion. We recall how Jesus at his last earthly meal told his friends and followers to love one another as he washed their feet. We strip the altar, the communion table, of all decoration and before leaving the church listen to the passage of how Christ prayed in Gethsemane.

Good Friday 29 March 12 noon – 3.00 pm

Come and consider some of those who were present leading up to the crucifixion and those standing at the foot of the cross. The church is open for you to come and go, for private contemplation with readings, reflections and prayers every 15 minutes. At 2 pm, for the last hour, we focus on the cross as we sing and pray some of those hymns and prayers that are associated with Good Friday.

Good Friday 7.30 pm A service of Reading the Passion, Jesus' last earthly days, concluding in darkness as the Tenebrae candles are extinguished one by one.

Easter Sunday 31 March

Dawn Service at 8.00 am Join us at the Easter Garden beside the church and at the 'open tomb' we will ponder the significance of a robin. Breakfast is served after the service.

Easter Parish Communion Service at 10.00 am. Celebrating the Resurrection, a joyous service followed by refreshments and an Easter Egg Hunt in the church grounds.

Evening Communion and Praise at 6.30 pm. Stepping out on the road to Emmaeus.

Spring Growth

Our mission partners in Nairobi have not let the grass grow under their feet since our visit last May. The community leaders have organised an additional food distribution to all the Tujisaidie school children and their teachers for the long school holiday, when school meals are unavailable. Funds were provided through St Mark's so that local artist Mathaga could use his talents to paint fabulous and inspiring murals in the new playground, and the children are loving this area as they wait for the builders to complete an additional wing to the school. The TAF community centre provides temporary classroom space while building progresses, and a group of young vulnerable women meet here regularly now for mentoring sessions as they look to the future. All these small steps of progress are an encouragement for us as we pray for our brothers and sisters and provide whatever practical support is possible. Thank you to all our very generous supporters.


