A Message from Helene, Rector in St Mark's

There is an amazing clock in Cambridge at Corpus Christi College. It was invented and designed by Dr John C. Taylor who invented the cordless kettle. It took seven years to build this spectacular clock, which is 1.2 metres wide, made of gold, and cost more than £1 million. It has no hands but shows the time with blue lights. On top of the clock, there is a creature, an ugly, angry monster, a cross of a grasshopper and a locust. With his front legs he pulls the time, eating it away. On the hour, every hour, he gets irate and furious, and with his sting, he kills the time.

Time that is past is gone. It is dead and can never be returned. Taylor calls the clock a Chronophage - time eater - wishing to illustrate that time is a destroyer, once a minute is gone, you can't get it back. There is an inscription on the clock: 'The world and its desires are passing away, but those who do the will of God live for ever.' (1 John 2:17)

This clock, with its inscription and depiction of how time passes, challenges us to pause and reflect about how we use our time. The beginning of a new term invites us to ponder how we wish to fill the weeks and months ahead of us. It is also a reminder that there are different times and seasons in our lives. Times for thought and contemplation; time for joy as well

as sadness; time for learning something new or perfecting something we have already begun. May I take this opportunity to encourage you to spend some time in the presence of God this autumn.

Jesus withdrew at times from the busyness of life to spend in his Father's presence. May we do likewise. Welcome to our services, where we meet Christ in word, prayer, and at the Holy table.

for instance the Lego building club and cooking for young teens. Welcome to try something new and spend time with us.

A time to learn from our friends in Kenya

The Tujisaidie community we support in Kayole, Nairobi, may face many challenges in life as they struggle with issues of extreme poverty, rising food prices, civil unrest and climate change. However as they work together, sharing any meagre resources, building a youth centre and library, and running a range of mentoring and support services, they have much to teach us.

During our visit in May, Linda and I saw at first-hand how everything is so carefully planned and prayed about, relying on God's provision and timing while at the same time building each other up and caring for the most vulnerable amongst them. The young people cooking meals on a Saturday ensured that the huge pot of rice stretched far enough to cater for over 350 children. The 60 children attending our knitting classes helped each other and patiently persevered, concentrating hard as they tried to master a new skill. The leaders are faith filled people who are determined not to be overwhelmed by the scale of the challenges





they face, but to find ways to encourage, to mentor, to improve employment skills and to give hope for a better future.

We returned home determined to continue to support them in all they are doing, providing funds for the essential school meals programme and school resources, and communicating through Zoom and Whats App for training and updates. If you would like to join our support group on Whats App, please contact the office. And if you missed our information meeting in June, keep an eye on our Social Media for a further meeting in September, when we hope to show some video footage from our visit and share some more stories.

Released in 1993, Shadowlands is the moving portrait of author C S Lewis' marriage to Joy Gresham, and how faith can help in the toughest of times. We will show the movie, starring Anthony Hopkins and Debra Winger, in the Parlour of the Parish Hall on Friday 10 November at 7.30 pm.

Discussion Group leader, Robert MacBride writes: We might recognise the appropriateness of a time for everything when we speak of the peaceful death in old age of someone who has enjoyed a life well-lived. Life, however, is often cut tragically short or comes to a point where it must be endured in circumstances no one could possibly desire. Is there a time for a motor-bike accident, for cancer, or dementia? It is a question which often challenges the faith of Christians, or at least prompts us to examine where human suffering fits into life in a world made good by God. St Marks most famous son, C S Lewis, was not afraid to tackle this most intractable subject. He explores it in different ways in his writings for both children and adults. A group of us will consider some of the issues raised in the film on 3 Monday evenings, 20 and 27 November and 4 December, at 7, 30 pm. Everyone, parishioner or not, with faith or without, is welcome. We hope for free and open discussion where we all learn together. If you come along do not expect to hear "This is the truth of the matter", at least not from the group moderator! We will be asking rather where and how do we find meaning in life's journey and accept that for some the question will be if that is possible.

A time for everything by Michael Newman

Many of us are returning from holidays, relaxed and invigorated ready to go back to work or back to school looking forward to catching up with our friends. For some this is a new beginning. A new term in a new class or new school, moving from school to college, apprenticeship or university, entering the world of work for the first time or changing job with the excitement and trepidation that brings. Or it maybe it's time to return to our normal routine.

We tend to think of the year as a cycle closely tied to the four seasons and sometimes try to think of our own lives as aligned to the seasons although in a linear design, rather than cyclical. Our lives though are much more complex and have dozens of different seasons within each of these periods and each of them contains good and bad times.

Yet, "there is a time for everything." In all the seasons of our lives, we move through these times of transitions—just like the weather does. Perhaps the transitions of life are harder than the seasons because we can feel the changes. Whatever season of life we find ourselves in, it will have a beginning and it will have an end. We will enter new seasons, too, that may bring joy, sadness, relief, hope or a deeper sense of faith.

Jesus reminded us that no matter what we go through, we can still have peace in him. God will bring us through to days marked by comfort, love and new life. Through it all, we can rest in the peace Jesus has given us. Regardless of what we face, God remains in control and is the author of our days. There is a time for everything.


